# Home Again

You gave Justine the support she needed to reunite with her kids.

We reported the first part of Justine's story in our previous Thankuary newsletter. Now she is ready to share more good news and gratitude.

Justine lived with her partner for 14 years before, she says, "his true colors came out. He wouldn't help me take care of the kids. He was mentally and physically abusive."

It was a dangerous, messy situation. In the aftermath, her partner went to jail, their two kids went to foster care, and Justine went to St. Vincent de Paul's supportive housing. There she has received the support she needed to find healing from the physical and mental trauma.

Today, she is grateful to finally have full custody of her kids again after more than a year. "Basically, I had to get myself back together," she says. "I was unemployed, I had no income. I went to Artemis

Center for support. I attended parenting classes, and I went to therapy for my mental health. It was a lot. But my goal throughout the whole process was to get my kids back."

Her case manager and supportive staff helped her through it all. Now, she says, "My kids are home! They are happy, they are smiling!" She receives enough social security income that she is able to focus on being a single mom to her kids and taking care of herself.

Her youngest child is autistic, and Justine is navigating how to best support her in the transition back home. They receive additional support from staff and a Children's Services case worker. "I talk to staff if I need anything," she says. "If I am overwhelmed, they help me find solutions. My therapist helps as well."

More than anything, she is grateful to be back with her children in their new home. "It's a lot more peaceful now," she says. "We do a lot of things together. At home, we watch Bluey and play games together. We color as well, but not on the walls. My oldest likes to color on the walls. I have since told her not to color on the walls." She jokes, "I tell you; I have gray hair coming out of my head!"

Jokes aside, Justine has shown incredible resilience and strength. Thank you for you making a difference in her family's life. Your support provides opportunities for families like Justine's to find stability and healing so they can continue to grow in love with one another.

## **Serving With Humility**

You are walking with Greg as he is getting back on his feet.

"This is my first and last time being homeless," Greg states. "I had a good life. I had a job, a wife, and two kids. I was using and dealing drugs, but I didn't let it control me. I lost control when I got onto crack."

That's when his life began to unravel. "I ran with it. I started to rob and steal. I spent over half of my life in addiction. I grew tired of it. I was killing myself. I lost my job, my house, my wife, and I had nothing."

He went to rehab and spent two years living in recovery houses. When it was time for him to move on, he came to St. Vincent's shelter. He has been here for several months while working to start a new life.

"St. Vincent has given me shelter, food, clothing – they have given me everything. I credit the staff for their support. Ever since I got here, the staff have helped." Greg is working with St. Vincent staff and Goodwill to find employment and housing. He also started serving meals at the shelter.

"I needed to give back," he insists. "If not for here, I would have nowhere else to go. There's no telling what I'd be doing if it wasn't for this place. I don't feel alone."

Shelter manager Joe Gebhart recalls, "Greg came to me humble and willing to assist the shelter with daily tasks to help him keep busy, find a way to give back, and support the staff, who he recognized were working hard to support him and the other guests. I felt as though God brought him to us with a heart to serve at the appropriate time."

There was a great need for help in the shelter's kitchen at the time, and Greg had a background of kitchen experience. Joe says he played an instrumental role in assisting staff and guests with the changes.

"I am grateful for his service," Joe says. "He displays a pleasant, professional attitude and is respected by the guests and staff. It has been a joy having him as a guest at

our shelter. We are all praying for his successful transition into housing soon."

As for what he will do when he leaves, Greg says, "When I get out of here, I want to give back. I see myself helping others, passing the friendship of God onto others."

Thank you for walking with guests like Greg and providing shelter, food, and clothing as they work to transition into housing.
